Fortunately, everyone made it through the Tunnel before it closed. Most everyone arrived Friday and Bill Brassette opened the Hospitality Room which we enjoyed before and after dinner. Saturday, the ladies had a tour, lunch, and a visit to a museum or shopping. The nobles had their meeting at the hotel at 3:00 pm.

The WCSC President Gary Weiszbrod opened the meeting at 3:00 pm in an abbreviated form with 19 nobles present. While participation for 2019 was up 40 percent there were many financial issues found in reviews that demanded immediate and detailed attention. Some issues were discussed with the Imperial Officers and Staff that led to specific items being referred to appropriate authorities. Illus. Bobby then gave summary of events followed by a "Q & A."

Our actions have surfaced other issues that were not adhered to, for example, Imperial Law specifically states that no Shrine meetings may be recorded in any manner whatsoever.

Illus. Sir Joe introduced Illustrious Sir Jim Stewart, Treasurer who addressed the following: there is a new non-profit tax-exempt form for the 501C-3 portion of our Temple. The significant change is that this may be used only for Shriner Hospitals for Children (SHC) and SHC transportation issues and events. No other Temple events or activities are eligible for tax exemption. Temple personal property and real estate taxes are paid and up to date. Remember, SHC is a 501C-3 but the SI and Temples are a 501C-10.

Financially all is now good news. Monies moved from one account to another and borrowed have all been transferred or paid so that our accounts are now properly accounted and follow all SI laws and guidelines. We are "in the black!"



Chili Cook-Off

A FEW GOOD MEN ARE NEEDED

Nearly sixty-two years ago on August 28, 1958, Illustrious Sir Carlton Ray authorized and empowered nineteen Nobles to associate themselves as an Inner body entitled the "Provost Guard" of El Jebel Shrine. The original purpose for the organization is described in the historical archives of the Provost Guard which then stated: "The Provost Guard was organized for the purpose of enforcing Temple regulations as authorized by the Potentate and further, to insure that Nobles of El Jebel comply with all City, State and Federal laws while functioning as a Shriner. Further, to protect all Shriners from criminal violators while functioning in mixed company with the general public and to be especially concerned about protecting and also guarding Nobles of El Jebel against thieves, robbers, and those intent upon assault or mayhem. "For this reason, our original by-laws that were initiated in 1950, mandated that a pre-requisite for membership in the Provost Guard is that an applicant must not only be a Shriner in good standing in this Temple but be a bona fide Law Enforcement Officer as pertains to the criminal code in a City, State, or Federal Agency. This philosophy has served us well for the past decades and we look forward to serving our fellow Nobles as competently and efficiently in the future."

As time progressed, the "mission statement", duties, procedures, by-laws and eligibility requirements of the original Provost Guard evolved and changed significantly in their content, to be consistent with changing times. Currently, the requirement to be a Mason and Shriner in good standing remains. However, while it continues to be preferred and recommended that member applicants be either active or retired members of either a bona fide civilian or military law enforcement agency, applicants with a dedicated special interest and knowledge of law enforcement techniques, common policies, procedures and laws may also be accepted as members.

The "pool" of membership of some units and clubs within El Jebel as well as other Masonic bodies has flourished and declined in the history of Masonry and the Shrine over the years. With the flourishing membership of El Jebel numbering 9000 +/- in the '80's to the current number of 880 +/-, the membership of many units of El Jebel Shrine has significantly diminished, and many former units once well-staffed with numerous members, have faded into the memories of our El Jebel Shrine history. Among those are many units that our long-term members may recall such as; the Arab Patrol, Boosters, DeMolay Knights, Drum and Bugle Corps, Hillbilly Band, German Band, Mariners, Mobil Nobles, Palomino Patrol, Raiedeen, Scimitar, Stewards, Tanzers, Temple Guard, Rumble Bees, Scooter Patrol and others.

The Provost Guard has similarly evolved and experienced a decline in membership. Time, illnesses, infirmities, and the Black Camel have taken over many of our The evolution of the Provost Guard has members. changed based on the activities and functions that have become inherent with our move to our new facility. Large "internal" gatherings that once were common in the larger venue of our former Shrine Center, are no longer possible. "Outside" activities at which the Provost Guard was called upon and authorized to provide services have also diminished. However, the Provost Guard continues to be needed as a professional, uniformed specialized unit that provides an observant and assisting presence to help ensure the safety and security of our property, and most importantly for our members and guests who attend our meetings and functions. Fewer "Outside" events such as the Sportsmen's Raffle and others as authorized, continue to provide the activities at which our presence may be requested is ongoing.

Although the "workload" remains as needed, the frequency is much less that our previous duties required. Meetings are now held quarterly unless others are called by the Provost Marshal as needed and/or requested by the Potentate for special events and activities that may be scheduled. The traditional law enforcement style uniform items are issued to active members by the Provost Guard Quartermaster with the exception of "personal" clothing items such as footwear. Issued uniform items remain the property of the Provost Guard and are returnable to the Quartermaster immediately upon deactivation of membership.

A "non-issued item" of the required uniform is a welcoming smile and hearty greeting for those whom we serve, coupled with the infrequent and rare necessity to contact, summon and coordinate with regular area law enforcement personnel when criminal activity is discovered that may require their presence.

In the aspect of FUN, the Provost Guard strives to maintain a "shooting team" for maintenance of fun, firearms safety and proficiency, and competition with other Shrine Temples' during the annual Central States Shrine Association events held throughout the Midwest. We would love to welcome and reinstitute our ladies' participation in these sporting activities. Part of the "work" requirements of our members includes some maintenance activities of the "private" range facilities at the Lazy Heart Ranch near Golden, owned and provided by the long time and well-loved Lewis Shrine family. Some meetings, work, training, practice sessions and activities are being planned at this wonderful venue in the coming months, as we welcome new members to revitalize and restore our presence at El Jebel Shrine.

The Provost Guard is in need of a few good men. If our mission and activities are within your areas of interest for some light "work" and some fun times, please contact us for obtaining detailed information and an application for membership in this great unit of El Jebel.

RENEWAL AND RESTORATION OF THE "EL JEBEL SHRINE PLAZA"

CONCEPTUAL DESIGN OF THE NEW EL JEBEL SHRINE PLAZA



Dear Nobles, Ladies and Friends of El Jebel Shrine. A lot of "dust" has settled since our relocation to a new building. There are many traditional and new tasks ongoing as we move forward to preserve the health and welfare of our beloved Shrine. Our history is full of tradition, records, customs and memories of our operations and presence in our Northern Colorado jurisdiction, and our supporting role as a part of Shriners International. Many activities and programs are ongoing in the constant efforts to fulfill our primary mission to support the efforts and operations of our Shriners Hospitals for Children.

This mission of Shriners International remains viable through the efforts and contributions of many Shriners and their Ladies, who dedicate their extraordinary talent, time, resources, love and heart to our purpose and this incredible fraternity in which we are members. As time progresses with the many kindnesses of life that our Supreme Architect has granted, the inevitable ending of lives as we know it, comes to us all. The actions and dedications of Shriners, present and past, constitute our heritage and survival. El Jebel Shrine has experienced the presence of many members who have distinguished themselves by their extraordinary and heroic support of our mission. On May 13, 2002, the El Jebel Shrine Plaza was dedicated with the purpose of honoring and commemorating the legacies of past and present contributions.

At that time, the Plaza consisted of the well-known statuary known as the "Editorial Without Words". The area at the base of this statuary was originally composed of crushed rock, later to become modified to accommodate the placement of honoraria engraved bricks. The bricks were available for purchase at various levels and prices as a "perpetual and visible symbol of esteem for the heroes and loved ones that we wish to honor, perhaps as a remembrance that each of us passed this way, a contributor, supporter and participant in our

Greatest Philanthropy in the World". The Plaza provided a new and unusual opportunity for our members and their families to say "Thanks", and to commemorate those very special heroes among us who touch our hearts, whether they are still with us, or have gone away to their higher reward. Several "levels" of bricks, ranging in price from \$100.00 to \$1,500.00+ in price were available for purchase, and many were placed in the Plaza as lasting tributes to those honored within the Plaza.

During the activities of the move to our new headquarters, the bricks of the Plaza were removed and reinstalled at our current location. In the transitional process of moving, the contractor's of the day placed the bricks in a sidewalk configuration which is currently in place, creating the controversy and desire among many of our Shriners to reconfigure the structure and placement of the Plaza to be a more appropriate, visible and dignified structure. The current configuration has proven to be destructive to the engravings on the bricks caused by foot traffic, weather conditions and undue exposure to the elements.

In 2019, a proposal was presented to the El Jebel Divan, for the reconstruction of the Plaza. Two primary designs were presented. After deliberation and consideration, one of the configurations included in the proposal was approved. Brief presentations were recently accomplished for the Presidents/Secretaries' informational and planning session for the 2020 year, and again at the January 2020 Stated Meeting. Funding for this project is not included in the El Jebel Operating Budget, and permission was granted to solicit funding from the generosity and graciousness of our members. Initial and ongoing contributions are being accepted by our Treasurer from individual members and/or El Jebel Units, specifically identified for the purpose of funding and maintaining the Plaza. As with the original Plaza planning, revenue from purchases will be specifically directed to the maintenance of the Plaza and/or El Jebel's Operating Fund.

The reconfiguration of the Plaza will facilitate the removal of the current bricks and plaques from their current "sidewalk", and placed in a new and true place of honor and dignity. The placement of the new Plaza is considered being best located as parallel to the existing sidewalk in the front of the building, and between the existing lighting "bollards" that will provide lighting and visibility during the hours of darkness. As shown in the conceptual drawing (below), the bricks and plaques will be placed in a "framed" and angled "plaza", beginning at near ground level, and sloping upward at an angle to a rear height of approximately three feet. This design will eliminate the need for snow removal, and the "wear" factor caused by foot traffic. Landscaping will be reconfigured in the area around the new plaza in the area where the bricks and plaques are currently located, to enhance the presentation of our building frontage. The end result will create an attractive and more visible structure that provides a more appropriate setting for those whose names and memories have been, and will in the future be memorialized and honored in the Plaza. At present, we are searching for two resources; First, we'll need a masonry contractor to construct the new Plaza. The project will include construction, removal and replacement of the existing bricks and plaques, placement of purchased bricks that have been stored and awaiting placement, and durable landscaping renewal and placement in the affected areas. When removed from their present locations, every attempt will be made to place the existing bricks and plaques within the Plaza in the same locations as they were at the Plaza's original location.

Secondly, we are researching availability of a new vendor for the production of new bricks and plaques, as our former vendor is no longer in business. We are currently in contact with the City of Westminster as they are presently researching the results of their Requests for Proposals from such vendors in order to continue with their ongoing project at the Westminster "Tribute Garden". Several other possibilities for a vendor/provider are also in progress. Until a vendor is secured, we can't identify a "sale price" for the bricks and plaques that will be available. A pricing structure for the available options from a new vendor will be determined and announced to our members as quickly as those details become available.

Your kind and gracious donations of funds for the construction and completion of the new Plaza in any amount are most welcome. Please direct your donations for the "El Jebel Shrine Plaza" to our Treasurer, Illustrious Sir Jim Stewart. Be assured that honoraria bricks and plaques will again be made available at the lowest possible prices, to be included in the new El Jebel Shrine Plaza, for any who wish to honor a friend or a loved one who contributed their time, efforts, participation and heart to our mission of Shriners.
